

Weather Brief for Thursday, 16 July 2026 from the Hydrometeorological Service, Guyana

Rainfall records for the past 24 hours, measured at 08:00hrs Thursday, 16 July 2026 were available for most of the stations. Portage Landing in Region 7 recorded the highest rainfall of 32.0 mm.

Marine Advisory: Residents of low-lying coastal and riverine areas are advised to take the necessary precautions against flooding, as overtopping is likely due to spring tides.

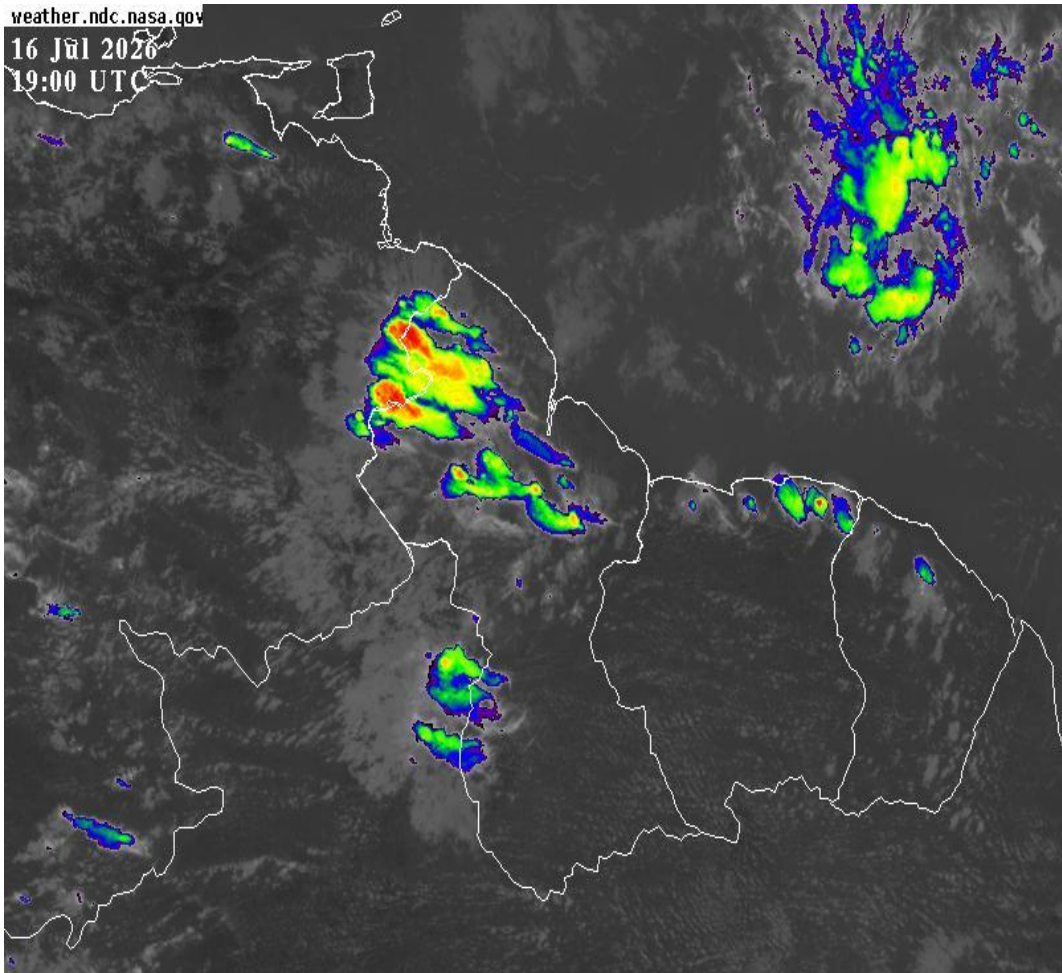
Synopsis: Trade wind plumes and localized conditions produced weak to moderate instabilities over most of the northern regions of the country. Similar atmospheric conditions are projected up to Saturday, after which the ITCZ is projected to produce some instabilities, mostly over the northern parts of the country.

Today’s weather review: Southern regions 6 and 9 observed mostly fair and sunny skies; elsewhere, partly cloudy and sunny skies with occasional showers and isolated thundershowers.

Spring Tide Advisory: The Spring Tide is in effect until July 19, 2026.

Sea conditions:

- Slight to moderate northeasterly seas with swells reaching 1.5 to 2.0 meters in open waters.
- These waves will likely have periods of between 7 and 8 seconds.
- Moderate easterly breeze.

Extended Forecast

Saturday, Monday, and Wednesday: Southern regions 6 and 9 can expect mainly fair and sunny skies; elsewhere, partly cloudy skies with occasional showers and isolated thundershowers. Rainfall is not expected to be significant over southern regions 6 and 9, elsewhere between 0 mm and 15 mm within 24 hours.

Sunday and Tuesday: Southern regions 6 and 9 can expect partly cloudy skies with brief showers; elsewhere, mostly cloudy skies with frequent showers and isolated thundershowers. Rainfall is expected to be between 0 mm and 10 mm over southern regions 6 and 9, elsewhere between 10 mm and 30 mm within 24 hours.
